I. Philosophy and character

II. Reframe to find luck.

- C. Heights by great men reached and kept were not obtained by sudden flight but, while their companions slept, they were toiling upward in the night. (Henry Wadsworth Longfellow)
- D. The only thing that overcomes hard luck is hard (and smarter) work.

- E. Perseverance is not a long race; it is many short races one after another. (Walter Elliott) (run intervals)
- F. Motivation is what gets you started. Habit is what keeps you going. (Jim Ryun)
- G. “You just don't luck into things as much as you'd like to think you do. You build step by step, whether it's friendships or opportunities.” (basic service brilliance + heroic acts + in-depth team selling that retunes the offering create events or lucky portholes with target prospects.)

- A. Luck is the residue of design.(Milton)

- D. One ship drives east and another drives west/ With the selfsame winds that flow./ 'Tis the set of sails and not the gales/ Which tells us the way to go.(Ella Wheeler Wilcox)

Strategic guidelines to wake up your luck:

Fish where the most, biggest, hungriest and best fish are AND your skills and type of boat can work sufficiently if not best)

1. Look for strategic innovation opportunities at the intersection of the best or most promising customers, your core competencies and emerging, favorable trends or events (regs).
 2. Generate a lot of ideas and fashion them into several very well-defined, more deeply thought out venture concepts.
 3. Pick battles big enough to matter, small enough to win.(John James Ingalls)
 4. Make no little plans! They have no magic to stir men's blood.(Daniel Burnham)
 5. Leaders don't wait. They shape their own frontiers. The bigger the challenge, the greater the opportunity.
 6. Design rapid experiments to minimize downside risk and cost and maximize upside learning and pathways.
 7. Watch for unforeseen opportunities that are attracted to your innovative forays; succeed for the wrong reasons.
 8. Have a pipeline of ideas and a portfolio of opportunities to keep luck constant.
 9. (Life) Luck is like riding a bicycle: it doesn't fall off unless you stop pedaling (the strategic innovation). (Claude Pepper)
- E. Luck affects everything; let your hook always be cast. In the stream where you least expect it, there will be fish.(Ovid)
 - F. “I've found that luck is quite predictable. If you want more luck, take more chances. Be more active. Show up more often.” (Using resources freed up from dying, undesirable or unprofitable activities.)

4. You create your opportunities by asking for them. (Patty Hansen) (make pitches to desirable (innovative) partners, but always ask for living edge needs to fill just in case you can help.)
5. Be ready when opportunity comes...Luck is the time when preparation and opportunity meet.

B. **Seize opportunities**

1. Have the carpe diem habit. If we can't seize daily living opportunities with panache, can we seize business opp's?
2. "If we didn't live venturously, plucking the wild goat **by the beard**, and trembling over precipices, we should never be depressed
3. To change one's life: Start immediately. Do it flamboyantly. No exceptions. (William James)

C. Conviction, passion, zeal, joy, flexible action

IX. **Hold on to opportunities with appropriate: timing, energy, focus, creativity and diplomatic/empathetic touch**

- A. A pound of **pluck** is worth a ton of luck.

- D. Nothing will ever be attempted if all possible objections must first be overcome. (Samuel Johnson) (avoid analysis paralysis. Perfection is the enemy of good enough and get going to fail and learn forward)
- E. There is far more opportunity than there is ability. (Thomas A. Edison)
- F. Enlarge the opportunity and the person will expand to fill it. (Eli Ginzberg)
- G. Any human anywhere will blossom in a hundred unexpected talents and capacities simply by being given the opportunity to do so. (Doris Lessing)
- H. You cannot afford to wait for perfect conditions. Goal setting is often a matter of balancing timing against available resources. Opportunities are easily lost while waiting for perfect conditions. (Gary Ryan Blair)
